Deciding a Degree Course

Recap of A-Level subjects

- Start with four A-Level subjects, but university offers based on three
- Consider your capabilities within the subject
- Keep your options open
- Consider your enjoyment of the subject
- Specific requirements for degree programmes



Deciding a Degree Course

Recap of A-Level subjects

- Some subjects are rated higher than others
- Take your own native language in Year 12 if possible
- Consider how subjects compliment each other
- Do not take more than two art subjects
- Take at least one facilitating subject for top universities

- Great opportunity to engage




Deciding a University

- Location and Environment
- Course Content degree courses vary significantly
- Grade Requirements
- Be ambitious You get five choices





What is UCAS?

- An independent charity providing information, advice, and admissions services
- Central body which manages UK university applications
- Manages 3 million applications from 700k students



What is UCAS?

Your Responsibilities

- Apply to up to five choices (usually different universities)
- Write your Personal Statement
- Complete all sections and send the application
- Communicate with subject-specific UCAS Advisor
- Keep updated about offers and supply additional information
- Accept offers

Personal Statement

What is it?

- It is an advertisement of you to the university
- A personal statement supports your application to study at a university
- An opportunity for you to differentiate your application from others
- You can only write one for your five choices
- 4000 characters 47 lines



Personal Statement

The Two Important Questions

- Why do you want to study the course?
- What makes you a suitable candidate?



Personal Statement

Evidencing your interest

- Demonstrate your interest beyond A-Level learning
- Chance to talk about areas in which you are passionate

"We want students who are really committed and engaged by the subject they are applying for and in many cases that will mean they need to **demonstrate** they read much wider than would be the case to get through their A-Levels"

Personal Statement Evidencing your interest

You need to consider

- What you did
- Why you did it
- What you learnt from it
- How has it changed you? What did it lead to?

LSE: "Remember we are interested not just in a list of what you have read/encountered, but evidence you have reflected on the academic idea"

Personal Statement

Important Tips

Focus your Application Towards One Course

"One of the major problems is where the personal statements doesn't relate to the course for which you've applied."

Personal Statement

Important Tips

Main focus should be academics, then extra curricular

"Many students like to include some details of their extra-curricular activities such as involvement in sports, the arts, volunteering or student government. As our Selectors are most interested in your academic interests, we recommend that no more than 20% of your statement is spent discussing extra-curricular activities."



Personal Statement

Important Tips

- Use academic language
- However, do not over complicate
- Clarity is key
- The same applies to A-Level essay responses



Personal Statement

Important Tips

Stand out from the crowd

- Consider the position of the person reading your statement
- Personalise it
- Be memorable



Personal Statement

What not to do?

- "My father has a computing company and I spent a month working their over the summer. During this time..."
- "Ever since I was a child..."
- "I am currently studying History, English, Maths and Chemistry..."
- "I have always wanted to go to LSE"



Personal Statement

What not to do?

- Don't discuss books in your statement that you haven't read
- Refrain from talking about A-Level content rather than things you have learnt independently
- Avoid famous quotes "Martin Luther King said 'I have a dream' and my dream is to study Economics"
- Do not plagiarise or copy





5.1 Reference and Predicted Grades

Reference

- Written by UCAS Tutors who are subject specialists
- Suitability for the chosen university course
- Support the information provided in the Personal Statement
- Used as an element of the decision-making process



5.2 Reference and Predicted Grades

Predicted Grades

- Decided by UCAS Tutor in consultation with subject teachers
- Year 12 results are a key factor
- HT1 Mock of Year 13 2nd opportunity
- HT2 Mock of Year 13 3rd opportunity
- Remember, we want your application ready as soon as possible



5.3 Reference and Predicted Grades

Predicted Grades should be:

- Aspirational but achievable stretching predicted grades are motivational for students, unattainable predicted grades are not
- Determined by professional judgement
- Data-driven (Year 12 results/Mocks)
- Flexible up until the application is formally submitted



5.4 Reference and Predicted Grades

Predicted grades should not be:

- Affected by student, parental, guardian, or carer pressure
- Dictated by university or college entry requirements

Year 12

May/June end of first year - Year 12 examinations

Year 13

- Mid-August release of Year 12 results
- 1st October Conservatoire deadline
- October 15th Oxbridge, Medicine, Dentistry deadline
- October 31st Ashbourne Internal Personal Statement deadline
- January 15th All other university courses deadline
- May Deadline to confirm Firm and Insurance
- Mid-August release of A-Level results
